


[Revealed] Kazuo Ishiguro (Novelist) Daily Routine in 2023

Who is Kazuo Ishiguro

- Sir Kazuo Ishiguro (born 8 November 1954) is a British novelist, screenwriter, musician, and short-story writer.
- Kazuo Ishiguro was born in Nagasaki, Japan.
- He studied English and philosophy at the University of Kent and then creative writing at the University of East Anglia, where he earned a master's degree in 1980.
- He is one of the most celebrated contemporary fiction authors in English.
- Kazuo Ishiguro has received four Man Booker Prize nominations and won the award in 1989 for his novel *The Remains of the Day*, which was adapted into a film of the same name in 1993.
- Ishiguro has been married to Lorna MacDougall, a social worker, since 1986.
- Their daughter, Naomi Ishiguro, is also an author, and published the book *Escape Routes*.

Morning of Kazuo Ishiguro

- **Wakes up early**

Kazuo Ishiguro wakes up early in the morning, As he is a great novelist of all time, his mind should be productive. Morning oxygen makes his mind more productive and with help of this he deliver his best content.

- **Writing schedule**

After finishing his breakfast, he starts his writing schedule at 9am in morning, He have two desk, one for making draft and another one is computer desk. He uses pen and paper for making draft and then he types on computer.

Afternoon of Kazuo Ishiguro

- **Lunch time**

After done with his first round of day, he have his lunch, while the time he put his mind on relaxation mode. After finishing his lunch, he get back to his desk.

- **Back to his work**

He works 6 days a week, he takes rest on sunday and spend his full day with family or plan a trip. He writes from 9 a.m. to 10.30 p.m.

When his novel being shortlisted for the 1986 Booker Prize and winning the Whitbread Book of the Year Award, it seemed like everyone wants his attention and this affects his writing schedule.

("Potentially career-enhancing proposals, dinner and party invitations, alluring foreign trips and mountains of mail had all but put an end to my 'proper' work," he wrote in The Guardian.)

Evening of Kazuo Ishiguro

- **Checks mails**

After writing he takes a small break in evening, in this time he checks his mails and messages and replies them.

- **Gets back to his desk**

Sir Kazuo Ishiguro has set daily target of 5 to 6 pages, and he completes it by a day. He thinks that quality matters than quantity, He thinks if he writes more then quality of his writing becomes substandard.

- **Dinner time**

After getting his work done and daily target finished, he has his dinner with his family. He enjoys this time, His all stress of hectic work day disappears while having gossips with his family.

- **Get to his bed**

After spending quality time with his family he gets to his bed, he takes deep sleep in night, after waking up in morning his cycles repeats.

Facts about Kazuo Ishiguro

- Kazuo Ishiguro has also written lyrics for jazz songs.
- He worked for a time as a social worker.
- His first employment after leaving school in the summer of 1973 was on the Scottish moorland, working as a grouse-beater for the Queen Mother at Balmoral Castle (the British royal family's summer retreat), assisting the royal guests to shoot game birds.
- He received the Nobel Prize in Literature in 2017.
- In his youth Kazuo Ishiguro first wanted to become a musician


Learning from Kazuo Ishiguro
